## **AAFP Student Interest Stakeholders Collaboration Training Workshop**

8:00 am – 4:30 pm

The AAFP Board of Directors invites you to attend a full day workshop that will create sustainable solutions to the student interest crisis faced by the specialty of family medicine. In 2009, we saw the lowest match rates of U.S. seniors into first year family medicine residency programs in over a decade. To address this student interest crisis, this initiative will sponsor four workshops around the country to bring together key stakeholders, such as AAFP chapters, FMIG faculty advisors, clerkship directors, community leaders, AHECs, residency directors and faculty, department chairs, resident and student leaders, with the goal of sharing and building knowledge, skills, and attitudes in the development of their own student interest activities.

AAFP staff will encourage and monitor collaborative activities throughout the year and provide resources, information and support for participants. The “Operation Collaboration” workshop will bring stakeholders together to identify shared goals, assess current activities in student interest, identify best practices, and determine new ideas and collaborative student interest initiative projects that they will develop and implement in the upcoming months.

## **ALSO Instructor Course**

8:00 am – 5:00 pm

*Organized by the New York State Academy of Family Physicians*

This one-day course focuses on specific teaching skills required for the didactic lectures, hands-on small group workstations, and testing stations presented in the ALSO Provider Course (must be a current provider to be eligible to attend the ALSO Instructor Course).

The ALSO Instructor Course includes sessions on:

- Teaching interactive workstations using mannequins and other equipment
- Presenting effective lectures
- Teaching workstations using slides
- Offering effective feedback

Eligible attendees are physicians, third-year residents, certified nurse midwives, and registered nurses. Active ALSO® Provider status is required for acceptance into the ALSO® Instructor Course.

## **Building Your Skills in Curriculum Development: Examples from Teaching about Developmental Disabilities**

8:00 am – 5:00 pm

The ACGME Outcomes Project challenges medical educators to be clear, thoughtful, and creative as they design, implement, and evaluate curriculum. Many teachers of family medicine and other stakeholders in the education of family physicians have gaps in their knowledge and experience in specific aspects of curriculum development, including: (1) creating new teaching & learning activities, (2) providing appropriate feedback to learners regarding their achievement of learning objectives, (3) adapting and effectively integrating existing curricular materials into an established program. The purpose of this workshop is for participants to expand their skill sets in these aspects of curriculum development.

In this general skill-building workshop, instruction about curriculum development and related participant exercises will feature examples from teaching family medicine residents about disabilities.

### **Goals:**

*After active participation in this workshop, participants will be able to:*

1. Appreciate the importance of a systematic approach to curriculum development
2. Consider potential applications for behaviorally-based feedback in their home programs
3. Articulate priorities for their home programs regarding curriculum integration and curriculum funding

### **Objectives:**

*By the end of this workshop, participants will be able to:*

1. Create an Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE)
2. Provide behaviorally-based feedback to a videotaped health care encounter
3. Adapt and integrate “off-the-shelf” written curricula into their residency programs
4. Cultivate “curriculum champions”
5. Explore when and how to fund curricular initiatives

## ***Health Care Innovator's Network "Primary Care Driven Solutions"***

8:00 am – 5:00 pm

Primary Care Driven Solutions are one of the best kept secrets in the US health care system. Why primary care? Because primary care is anchored in an accessible, effective, efficacious, and equitable model of health care. Primary care means: first contact (they take all comers); relationship centered; comprehensive and coordinated care. When primary care leaders tackle a problem they see the big picture and focus on the needs of patients and their families. Their solutions have been ignored in the past. For the good of our communities, it's time to increase awareness of primary care driven approaches to health system improvement.

There is substantial innovation occurring in the primary care sector of the health system. Primary care practitioners have a special interest in improving service delivery and impact of care. Many are investing time and energy in developing tools and services that will support their work. The innovators do not have experience with and/or the time to showcase their innovation and attract the attention of business partners who can help take their innovation to market. As a result, their solutions generally do not move beyond a local level.

The Innovator's Network provides a medium for these groups to showcase their work and receive useful feedback. It also provides a place for employers, union leaders, hospital administrators, investors and others who looking for strategies to improve care delivery while controlling/reducing the cost of health services.

## ***FMEC IMPLICIT Network Meeting: Reducing the Rates of Low Birth Weight/Premature Babies***

8:00 am – noon

The FMEC IMPLICIT Network involves 20+ Family Medicine Residency Programs and Community Health Centers working together to reduce the rates of low birth weight and premature birth. The network comes together during the regional meeting to review progress and set goals for the coming year.

## ***Fertility Appreciation Collaborative to Teach the Systems***

8:00 am – noon

Over the past 40 years, significant innovations have been made in women's health care, particularly within the realm of reproductive science. Parallel to these advances, natural methods for monitoring fertility have been standardized and refined. This has led to more effective tracking of a women's cycle and the times of fertility. These can be used to achieve or postpone pregnancy, and in some cases to address underlying gynecological problems.

Despite advances in fertility awareness methods and evidence based research demonstrating its effectiveness, the majority of physicians and health care professionals have limited knowledge about how these methods work and how some can be applied to address women's health problems. This may be due to the fact that this information is not routinely integrated into medical school and other health professional training curricula.

Formed in 2010, the Fertility Appreciation Collaborative to Teach the Systems (FACTS) seeks to update the primary care community with regard to fertility awareness methods and their applications in health and disease and to help promote fertility awareness methods as effective, relationship-centered reproductive health care for motivated women and couples.

### ***Goals of the workshop***

1. Review current Strategic Plan – progress towards SMART goals
2. Explore motivation for support of the natural methods and practice principles of respectful dialogue to find common ground in discussing sensitive issues.
3. Develop specific plans to obtain resources to support the work of the collaborative, both financial and human resources

## ***Rural Health: Strengthening the Primary Care Workforce in Rural Communities in the Northeast Region of the US***

8:00 am – noon

This workshop will build on the AAFP Student Interest Stakeholders Collaboration Training Workshop offered the previous day. We strongly encourage attendance in this program if at all possible.

While the decreasing number of medical students choosing careers in primary care is having a substantial impact on all communities in the US, it has a greater impact on rural communities. As a result, the health of people in rural America may be jeopardized unless efforts are made to address this issue.

Within each state in the northeast region of the US, there are organizations and agencies with a special interest in strengthening health services in rural communities. From AHECs to small and large primary care practices, state wide primary care associations and chapters of the AAFP, hospitals and colleges and universities, there are a myriad of groups interested in this issue. Often these groups are working in isolation.

We believe there is need to create strategies that will strengthen sharing of best practices and stimulate adoption of innovative methods that can improve the attractiveness of practice in rural settings while expanding the pipeline that feeds Family Physicians/primary care to rural communities.

The Family Medicine Education Consortium invites leaders of all organizations interested in responding to this problem to join an initiative that will lead to implementation of collaborative strategies that can address this issue.

### ***Goals of the initiative:***

- a) increase the numbers of students choosing careers in primary care;
- b) increase the number of students from rural communities in our medical schools;
- c) prepare residents to practice in a rural community;
- d) develop strategies that will increase the attractiveness of practicing in a rural community;
- e) increase the interaction among the organizations with a special interest in this issue (e.g. medical schools, residency programs, primary care practices, AHECs, etc.)

## ***Successful Integration of Behavioral Health into Primary Care***

8:00 am – noon

The environment, the evidence and available tools make Behavioral Health Integration not only a good idea, but necessary for providing good quality primary health care. New Patient Centered Medical Home standards require programs and monitoring of behavioral health issues. Implementing quality improvement strategies for identified priority patients improves patient care, improves the health of a practice population and reduces costs. It is no longer acceptable to avoid dealing with mental health, substance abuse, and behavioral health issues.

Mental health, substance abuse and behavioral issues account collectively for over 30% of global disability. Depression vies with ischemic heart disease for being the top contributor to global disability. Providers and practices need help in addressing these issues.

This preconference brings together regional and national experts, who will provide participants with practical tools, successful clinical, operational and financial approaches and policy initiatives that support successful behavioral health integration now and in the future.

### ***Target Audience:***

primary health care and behavioral health care providers, teachers and administrators from private practices, primary health care systems, mental health care systems, and state agencies.

### ***Program Goals***

After participating in this workshop, participants will leave with the following to help integrate behavioral health into a primary care practice:

- Operational tools to assess the mental health, substance abuse, and behavioral health needs and impact on primary care practices
- Practical strategies to meet the needs of priority patients
- Increased knowledge of the financial aspects and policy issues related to behavioral health integration
- Increased knowledge and opportunities to participate in integrated behavioral health learning collaboratives, training programs, and coaching to continually support, sustain and improve behavioral health and primary care integration

## Special Tracks of Programming During the Meeting

### **Osteopathic Medicine Track**

Faculty from the Osteopathic medicine schools/programs in the northeast region have developed programming that is especially intended to respond to the needs of faculty, residents and students in Osteopathic pre-doctoral and residency programs. All participants are welcome to attend these sessions.

### **Rural Initiative**

The health of rural communities is being undermined because of the decline of students choosing primary care careers who will choose to practice in rural communities. This initiative will bring together a variety of stakeholders with a special interest in this area. We will explore creative strategies that can be used to address this issue.

### **Social Media – Advocacy**

There is a level of social activism and desire to change the systems in our communities that influence the health of the population. This initiative will teach students, residents and faculty how to plan, implement and evaluate social media-advocacy efforts. The initiative's overall intention is to create a social network of talented and vision-driven "change agents" who understand the skills and principles involved in system change.

### **Leadership Development**

Supporting Family Physicians in their leadership development, in clinical and academic settings, is a high priority. This programming will be of interest to all those seeking to expand and extend their impact.

### **Maternal Child Health (MCH – IMPLICIT Track)**

The IMPLICIT project continues to grow. At this year's meeting on Friday morning in a pre-conference program format, the IMPLICIT project will meet to review findings from the CQI study. Project members will also review the operation of the program. Throughout the meeting a Maternal Child Health track is offered. Programs, practices and community health centers interested in learning how to join the IMPLICIT network and implement the project are invited to attend. This is a great networking opportunity for students, residents and faculty with a special interest in this area.

### **Super Utilizer Project – Reducing Hospital Readmissions**

The innovative approach to health system change, pioneered by Jeffrey Brenner, MD and his team at the Camden Health Care Coalition in New Jersey, has drawn national attention through *The New Yorker* magazine article authored by Atul Gawande, MD. Dr. Brenner and his team have been coaching leaders from a dozen Family Medicine Residency Programs and Community Health Centers who have been learning to apply this approach to care. The group members will meet at the regional meeting to report on their progress.

### **Family Medicine Global Health Leadership Initiative**

Family Physicians have a special interest in supporting sustainable development in the developing world. Presenters will share best practices and innovative strategies. The track also provides an opportunity to get connected with leaders in this area.

### **Exploring the Collaboration Between Family Medicine and Preventive Medicine**

We invite all in Family Medicine and Preventive Medicine who are interested in growing the collaboration between our communities to join us to consider how we might work together.

During the meeting, a number of current collaborative programs will present their approach to this issue. We'll also participate in strategic planning to help plan how we can move forward together in our efforts to train medical students and residents as well as work collaboratively to improve the health of the nation.

### **The Teaching Health Center: CHC-Academic Family Medicine Collaboration**

We believe the fastest, quickest way to increase the production of Family Physicians is to create collaborative relationships between FQHCs/CHCs and Family Medicine Residency programs. The innovators and early adopters who have created sustainable teaching health center models will share their best practices and models with conference participants. This programming will be valuable to both Community Health Center and Family Medicine Residency program leaders.

### **Harvard Medical School Town Hall Meeting**

Stakeholders interested in the growth of Family Medicine at Harvard Medical School will meet to consider how to increase Family Medicine's presence and visibility at this school. Participants will include Harvard Medical School alumni who chose careers in Family Medicine, current HMS students interested in Family Medicine, and community leaders interested in this issue.

### **Preparing to Succeed in Practice – Resident-Employer "Conversations"**

Approximately 175 Family Medicine residents and 270 medical students will attend the 2011 meeting. We offer opportunities for those seeking to employ Family Physicians to connect directly with the learners currently in the "pipeline." This program will also help residents and medical students learn how to succeed professionally and financially as a Family Physician.

### **Student Track**

A series of workshops and seminars are included in the Student Track. These sessions are designed for students of all levels and include didactic and skill/clinical learning sessions. These presentations will appeal to students, residents and faculty interested in learning more about the breadth and depth of Family Medicine.

### **Improving Palliative Medicine and End of Life Care in Family Medicine Residency Programs**

This forum is intended for all family physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants and behavioral medicine professionals interested in this topic. During the forum we will share our "best practices" and resources used in our respective training efforts. We seek to foster dialogue and collaboration among those new to this area as well as those with substantial experience.

### **Family Medicine Book Signings**

Family Physicians and behavioral health professionals will have an opportunity to market their books with conference participants.

### **Exhibitors**

We offer organizations and companies interested in Family Medicine/primary care an opportunity to participate in an Exhibitors Hall. Exhibits are placed in an area that provides high visibility on Friday and Saturday during the meeting. With an attendance of more than 250 Family Physicians, 175 Family Medicine residents and 270 medical students from the northeast region of the US (Ohio, to Maine to DC and Virginia), this meeting provides a means of connecting with the Family Medicine community. ### **“Is There a Doc in the House? Fitting the Physician into the Patient-Centered Medical Home”**

David Loxterkamp, MD

The Patient Centered Medical Home™ model has been touted as the last best hope for primary care. But what kind of doctor is needed there? Before we answer this – before we blindly adopt the PCMH playbook – let’s ask, “What is the purpose of primary care? Who is the family physician: past, present, and future?” Dr. Loxterkamp has been observing his patients, his practice, and the evolution of family medicine for the past 30 years. He participated in the Future of Family Medicine report, the National Demonstration Project, and the Maine Patient-Centered Medical Home Pilot. He is both a champion and critic of the brand “Family Medicine” as it is being promoted for emerging medical markets.

#### **Biography:**

**David Loxterkamp, MD** is a family physician from Belfast, Maine, where he has lived for 23 years with his wife, Lindsay, and their two children. His stories and essays have appeared in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, *Journal of the American Medical Association* and the *British Medical Journal*. He has written popularly for *America Magazine*, *Commonweal* and the *Boston Globe Sunday Magazine*. His work as a family physician was the subject of a *Life Magazine* photoessay in 1998 and an NBC *Nightline* documentary in 2000.

Dr. Loxterkamp grew up in rural Iowa, attended Creighton University and The University of Iowa College of Medicine, and completed an MA in the Social Sciences at the University of Chicago (1984) and a fellowship in Family Medicine at the University of California, San Francisco (1994). His interests include running, choral music, and the history of American architecture.

He has authored *A Measure of My Days: The Journal of a Country Doctor* (University of New England Press, 1997) and contributed to three anthologies: *A Life in Medicine*, edited by Robert Coles and Randy Testa (The New Press, 2002), *Professions of Face*, edited by James Martin and Jeremy Langford (Sheed & Ward, 2002), and *The Country Doctor Revisited*, edited by Therese Zink (Kent State University Press, 2010). A new book, *Conversation, Friendship & Hope: The Journey of a Country Doctor*, will be published by the University of Michigan Press in 2012.

Glen R. Stream, MD, MBI, FAAFP, AAFP President

**Glen R. Stream, MD, FAAFP, MBI**, a family physician in Spokane, Wash., is president of the American Academy of Family Physicians. As president of the AAFP, Stream advocates on behalf of family physicians and patients nationwide to inspire positive change in the U.S. health care system.



Stream has been a family physician serving the Pacific Northwest for more than 25 years. He joined the Rockwood Clinic, the largest multi-specialty practice in Spokane, Wash., in 1991. At the clinic, he has served as board member, chief privacy officer, medical director of clinical information services, now as chief medical information officer and continues to see patients. Graham Stream is 22 years old and a recent graduate of Washington State University and Ian Nordstrom, 21 years old and a senior at Gonzaga University.

## Saturday Plenary Presentation

### **“Bending the Cost Curve and Improving Quality in One of America’s Poorest Cities – Camden, NJ”**

*Jeffrey Brenner, MD*

The City of Camden is one of America’s poorest cities. For the last nine years, the Camden Coalition of Healthcare Providers has been working to build a citywide coalition to improve the quality, capacity, and accessibility of healthcare services while reducing costs. Driven by a homegrown patient-level database with eight years of longitudinal hospital claims records for every city resident, the Coalition has worked methodically to redesign how healthcare is delivered and target services to the most costly and complex patients. The Coalition efforts include a combination of primary care clinical redesign, a citywide Health Information Exchange, outreach projects targeted to the highest cost patients, patient education programs, and community organizing. The Camden Coalition worked with the NJ Chamber of Commerce, NJ Hospital Association, Citizen Action, and other partners to pass a Medicaid Accountable Care Organization (ACO) bill in August 2011. The bill will permit shared savings to be captured from reductions in ER and hospital use in Medicaid and the Camden Coalition will be the first Medicaid ACO in New Jersey. The Coalition was recently featured in an article by Dr. Atul Gawande in *The New Yorker* and on PBS’ *Frontline*.

#### **Educational Objectives:**

1. Participants will learn that healthcare is the primary cause of the long-term federal debt in the US and that reducing costs will have dramatic consequences for how healthcare is organized
2. Participants will review how hospital claims data has been used in the City of Camden to build citywide strategies to improve care and reduce costs
3. Participants will learn about healthcare coalition building and Safety Net ACOs as a strategy for improving coordination and quality of services and reducing costs

#### **Biography:**

**Dr. Jeffrey Brenner, MD** is a family physician that has worked in Camden, NJ for the past twelve years. Dr. Brenner owned and operated a solo-practice, urban family medicine office that provided full-spectrum family health services to a largely Hispanic, Medicaid population including delivering babies, caring for children and adults, and doing home visits. He attended Robert Wood Johnson Medical School and completed a Family Medicine residency at the Swedish Health Center in Seattle, Washington.

Dr. Brenner is the Director of the Institute of Urban Health at Cooper Hospital where he has spearheaded innovative solutions for improving the health of urban, underserved communities.

Recognizing the need for a new way for hospitals, providers, and residents to collaborate he founded and has run the Camden Coalition of Healthcare Providers since 2003. The Camden Coalition is a non-profit organization, committed to improving the quality, capacity, and accessibility of the healthcare delivery system in Camden. Dr. Brenner’s work is dependent on building complex collaborations amongst three highly competitive hospitals, two local FQHCs, and small private offices in Camden. Through the Camden Coalition, local stakeholders are working to build an integrated, health delivery model to provide better care for Camden City residents.

His life’s goal is ensure that all families who live in urban, underserved communities receive high quality, culturally competent, personalized family health care.



## Sunday Plenary Presentation

October 23, 2011 – 8:00 am

### **“Continuity of Care: Antique Tradition or Advanced Practice?”**

*Lucy Candib, MD*

Continuity of care is a treasured aspect of family medicine for those who have had the privilege to know patients and families over the years and across generations. The benefits of continuity of care are well known: increased patient and provider satisfaction, fewer interventions, and decreased cost of care. Even relatively short periods of continuity bring benefits. However, mobility in today's society almost guarantees that most young physicians and trainees will practice for fewer years in more locations, reducing the possibility of long-term continuity of care. Dr. Candib, who has taught and practiced family medicine in a community health center/residency training site for more than 35 years, will describe the evolution of her own choices to stay in one practice for her entire career. For those who will face more short term practice choices in training and in the early practice years, she will detail a set of strategies to accelerate the process of deep knowing and patient trust fostered by continuity of care.

#### **Goals and objectives:**

After this plenary, participants will be able to:

- list three evidence-based benefits of continuity of care
- describe the relational process fostered by continuity of care
- enumerate five strategies to accelerate the sense of continuity and depth of knowing in shorter term relationships

#### **Biography:**

**Lucy M. Candib, MD**, Professor of Family and Community Medicine, U-MASS Medical School, is a family physician educator who has taught and practiced family medicine, including obstetrics, at the Family Health Center of Worcester, in an urban neighborhood in Worcester, MA, since 1976. This health center is a residency training site within the U-MASS Family Practice Residency Program.



In the course of treating patients with chronic illness, Dr. Candib was an early adopter of group visits for English- and Spanish-speaking patients with diabetes. Increasingly concerned about obesity in low-income and multicultural populations, she developed an innovative exercise collaboration between the health center and local fitness facilities enabling the center's patients to complete over 80,000 exercise visits in the last seven years.

She has also focused attention on the concerns of women trainees and practitioners in her work with family practice residents and has lectured widely on the topics of sexual abuse and violence against women.

The author of numerous articles in refereed journals, Dr. Candib introduced a feminist critique of medical theory in her book, *Medicine and the Family: A Feminist Perspective* (Basic Books, 1995). Together with Dr. Sara Shields, Dr. Candib co-edited *A Woman-Centered Approach to Pregnancy and Birth*, (Radcliffe Medical Press, 2010) which addresses the role of continuity in maternity care.

In 2010 Dr. Candib received the F. Marian Bishop Leadership Award from the Society of Teachers of Family Medicine, recognizing her sustained, long-term commitment to family medicine in academic settings.
