 We co-sponsored the event with the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) and American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP).
- Preparing Residents: Preparing to Succeed In Practice, a resident focused educational session, held its 10th successful event during the FMEC Annual Meeting - sponsored by ChenMed and Geisinger.
- Developing Faculty/Leadership: The FMEC offers education and support through its annual meeting and through events held in each marketplace in the northeast region. The services respond to the needs of senior, mid-career and new faculty members.
- Sustaining Projects: The FMEC continued its FACTS and IMPLICIT projects, completed a new project on Integrative Health, and started developing projects on medical humanities, weight loss counseling, and more.





2021 FMEC PROJECTS &

Learning Communities

We empower family physicians by serving as a catalyst, convener and incubator for their work. We create multi-institutional teams that advance the ideas of FMEC members. We support each community as it forms and grows. We have helped family physicians to take their ideas from conception to implementation. Over the years, projects like <u>Smiles for Life</u> and <u>Pulse: Stories from the Heart of Medicine</u> began as projects supported by the FMEC. We are proud to help family physicians to succeed.



I.M.P.L.I.C.I.T.

Founded in 2003, the IMPLICIT Network is a maternal and child health

learning collaborative, focused on improving birth outcomes and promoting the health of women, birthing people, infants, and families through innovative models of care, quality improvement and professional development. Since 2014, 36 IMPLICIT clinic sites have implemented interconception care (ICC), with 29 actively working with IMPLICIT as of the end of 2021, including new sites such as Reading Family Medicine Residency, MetroHealth and others. During the FMEC 2021 Annual Meeting in Pittsburgh, PA, attendees learned about data management, cultural humility and responsiveness, and other topics, and breakout groups discussed sustaining the network, data accountability and community engagement. Through the fall of 2021, the network had worked with over 31,000 birthing person/child dyads and reported on over 122,000 wellchild visits.



Thanks to generosity of its supporters as well as the team's dedication, perseverance, and flexibility, the <u>FACTS</u> Fertility

Appreciation Collaborative not only maintained its offerings but expanded in important ways.

- The <u>FACTS medical elective</u> remains one of the most effective educational opportunities for medical and health professional students interested in learning more about Fertility Awareness-Based Methods (FABMs). FACTS saw more student enrollments in our online elective over the last academic year than in the previous 2.5 years combined!
- FACTS offered its second virtual conference in 2021 and welcomed 265 people from around the world to learn more about FABMs. FACTS also held its first virtual <u>FACTS speaker</u> <u>training</u>, preparing a dozen more medical professionals to share the evidence about FABMs.
- FACTS premiered its newest presentation, <u>a webinar for</u> <u>adolescents titled</u>, "Know Your Body," which was well received!
- FACTS launched an innovative 6-part CME course called Fertility

 Awareness Based Methods (FABMs) for Family Planning and

 Restorative Reproductive Women's Healthcare. This course
 prepares medical professionals to present FABMs as options
 for family planning, women's health monitoring, and medical
 management of common reproductive health concerns. It is
 approved for up to 74 AAFP-approved CME credits.
- Finally, FACTS promoted two important databases. The FABM
 Professionals Database provides a searchable, national database of physicians, medical professionals, and fertility educators.

 The FABM Research Database features a collection of over 130 fertility awareness related articles, with a summary of key results and conclusions, available to paid FACTS members.

INTEGRATIVE HEALTH

Launched in 2020 and sponsored by the Samueli Foundation, the FMEC Integrative Health Learning Community (IHLC) is improving the delivery of person-centered




integrative health practices into routine primary care. Social and behavioral determinants of health are poorly managed in medicine, and the COVID pandemic highlighted even further the need to enhance our ability to address chronic disease risks and those disproportionately affected such as the elderly, minorities, the poor, and people of color. The IHLC is helping 17 practices use the HOPE (Healing Oriented Practices and Environments) tools during visits, understand non-pharmacological approaches for pain and opioid management, and integrate evidence-based complementary treatments and support of self-care for chronic diseases into practice. In late 2021, the practices completed a year of educational sessions and quality improvement cycles and presented their results at the FMEC 2021 Annual Meeting. A small group is continuing to meet into 2022 while the FMEC plans its next cycle of the learning community.

2021 FMEC Annual Meeting BY THE NUMBERS

The 2021 FMEC Annual Meeting was held October 8-10, 2021 in Pittsburgh, PA. Despite a difficult year, the meeting was a huge success, attended by **261** faculty members, **174** residents, and **237** medical students.

The Residency Fair featured nearly **70** residency program booths and was as lively and loud as ever.

The program featured over **170** workshops, seminars, research presentations, discussions and more and nearly **100** posters.

In 2021, the FMEC Board of Trustees announced that Laurence Bauer, the founding CEO, had decided to step aside and welcome a new CEO to lead FMEC. "Family medicine in the northeastern United States and across the country has benefitted from Larry's creativity, endless energy and ability to connect people and ideas to improve and advance the world of Family Medicine. He recruited all of us, and so many others before us, to serve as Board members of this dynamic nonprofit, shaping the future of Family Medicine through education, innovation, and inspiration." Larry served as CEO from 1994 to 2021. Previously, he was Director of Organization and Faculty Development at the Ohio State University School of Medicine, Department of Family Medicine and was Director

of Faculty Development and Behavioral Science in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the Pennsylvania State University School of Medicine. "We send rounds of applause echoing across the country to Larry for his contributions to the family medicine movement and to the FMEC, in particular," said Dr. Woolever. "As Larry is fond of saying, 'It turns out that family medicine really is rocket science!' and in the FMEC, he's built an organization poised to propel the Family Medicine movement into the future."
