Conference Description:

Dear Colleague,

Welcome to the 24th annual meeting of the Society of Teachers of Family Medicine: NorthEast Region. The theme of our conference is ***“Evolution to Revolution: Let’s Move On!”*** The academic Family Medicine community in the central Pennsylvania area has come together to serve as hosts of this year’s conference. It’s been more than a year since the *Future of Family Medicine Report* was published. It’s time to challenge our systems and ourselves so we can re-energize the primary care service and education systems in our respective communities.

The nation’s health care system continues to expand while a growing number of people have no or very limited access to affordable health care. Many in the nation are concerned with the quality of care in addition to the costs of care. While we add new technologies and services, there does not appear to be a noticeable increase in the quality of care received or improvement in health outcomes. In fact, the more services patients receive, the greater the likelihood they will be injured by the “systems” that provides care. Health care disparities among many groups within our communities also challenge us to rethink how our systems function.

Family Physicians have a long history of patient-centered care that is sensitive to the issues affecting the health of their patients and the communities they serve. While Family Physicians play a critical role in the health delivery system, working alone towards reform dampens their influence. Many professional and lay organizations are seeking ways to influence the health care systems at local, state, regional and national levels. Employers, patient advocacy organizations, government officials and agencies at all levels as well as a number of medical organizations are actively concerned with these issues. How can we create collaborative strategies among those seeking meaningful health care reform?

Through this year’s meeting, we intend to focus attention on these issues, to challenge ourselves to a renewed commitment to work toward change and to build bridges among the wide set of constituents interested in health system improvement. Let’s find strategies that will allow the health care system to provide effective primary health care services to this generation and the next. Can we help to energize a move from an incremental evolution to a true revolution? Let’s move on!

We are excited with the speakers who will lead our plenary sessions. On Friday afternoon, William Terry Kane, MD will reflect on the challenge that lies ahead given the brokenness of the nation’s health care system. As a member of the core group that produced the *Future of Family Medicine Report*, he will also share his vision for system redesign. The Saturday plenary session will feature Wanda Filer, MD, who will provide a perspective on how Family Physicians can influence the state and community level decisions that create the policies shaping the health services and systems. On Sunday, Thomas Weida, MD will share his “vision” and experience in a physician owned, community-based office that put the ideas and principles from the *Future of Family Medicine Report* into action, years before the Report was published.

The medical student workshops and seminars are intended to be of specific interest to medical students interested in exploring topics related to clinical and academic Family Medicine. There are also sessions intended for residents. While these sessions are noted

specifically on the schedule (S) or (S/R), students (as well as all attendees) are **welcome to attend any portion of the meeting**. We expect an attendance of approximately 225 medical students and many of them will be presenting their own projects.

The meeting includes a number of components:

Faculty Program: Workshops and seminars that reflect the diverse group of professionals that participate in Family Medicine

Student Program: Seminars and Workshops chosen specifically to be of interest to medical students with a desire to learn more about Family Medicine. Students are welcome to attend any sessions offered during this conference.

Residency Fair Program: During the Friday and Saturday dinner and lunch functions, faculty and residents will have an opportunity to informally interact with students. This year we’ve added a **Clinical Camp** program that will provide small-group, interactive learning opportunities for medical students. We believe this venue will provide a rich opportunity for faculty, residents and students to get acquainted. Please review the **Clinical Camp** flyer in the registration packet for more details.

Social Program: On Saturday evening following the Residency Fair, we’ll have a **Halloween costume contest** followed by an evening of dance. To add to the holiday theme, we encourage Residency Fair participants to offer candy in a **Trick or Treat** motif.

Through the generosity of our conference sponsors and donors and the Family Medicine Residency Programs participating in our Residency Reception program, scholarships covering registration fee, meals and lodging are available for the students attending the meeting.

We welcome the medical students who are participating. Your presence adds to the richness of our meeting. Thanks also to the many donors and contributors who provided educational grants to support the students’ attendance at this year’s meeting.

The STFM: NorthEast Region Meeting provides a forum for those involved in Family Medicine to network and learn from one another. It is an excellent place for faculty, fellows and residents to stay abreast of Family Medicine issues, and develop teaching and scholarly skills. The student program encourages future physicians to pursue careers in Family Medicine and provides an excellent opportunity for collegial interaction. This is a superb opportunity to renew old relationships while developing new ones with colleagues with similar interests.

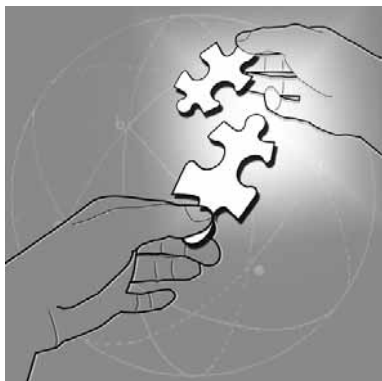

1) ***“Improving Services for Adults and Children with Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities and Other Special Needs”*** (Crystal A)

The Pennsylvania Academy of Family Physicians Foundation (PAFP/F) Medical Homes project is creating a network of office practices willing to respond to patients and families with special needs in their respective communities. The Family Medicine Education Consortium (FMEC) is supporting this effort through its project: ***Closing the Gap: Improving Services for People with Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities***. This project seeks to improve the training of Family Medicine residents and to create linkages between Family Physicians and the service and advocacy community that supports people and families with MR/DD issues throughout the northeast region of the U.S.

We have jointly planned a daylong conference that will accomplish the following goals:

- a) Prepare the Family Medicine Medical Homes in Pennsylvania to offer continuous and compassionate care to individuals and families with special needs in their respective communities;
- b) Create linkages between the Medical Homes and the service and advocacy organizations in their respective communities;
- c) Showcase this effort to those in Family Medicine/health care and service and advocacy communities in the northeast region who are seeking models to improve health services for people with special needs including MRDD issues;
- d) Reach out to interested family members and lay groups in Pennsylvania who want to learn about how to improve medical services for people with special needs and MRDD issues.

This is one step in a long-term process that will strengthen relationships among those in Pennsylvania concerned with improved care for people with special needs and it serves to extend this process to states across the northeast region of the U.S.

3) ***“Health Care Reform: New Models and Strategies to Strengthen Primary Care”***
(Crystal A) (8:00 am - 5:15 pm)

This forum brings together physicians-in-practice, employers, insurers and policy makers to discuss how to improve quality and control the cost of medical services. The forum will address a series of primary care health improvement strategies that offer hope for the future.

Public and private groups are calling for redesign of primary care services. While many have embraced the call for change, most primary care medical offices are struggling to cope with the current system and have little energy or time to redesign. Is there a way for the groups that plan, finance and evaluate primary care services to support the transformation? This forum is an attempt to bring the voice of Family Medicine/primary care into the conversation within the central Pennsylvania market place and to begin consideration of how to accomplish this goal throughout the northeast region of the US

Four medical practices that are “early adopters” of new clinical and business systems will represent the primary care practices in this conversation. These practices collectively serve approximately 100,000

people in central PA. Having already adopted Electronic Medical Records, these practices stand ready to redesign yet are trapped in a reimbursement system that includes a pay-per-visit model and the “administrivia” associated with the current system. The presentations and ensuing conversation will examine how the practices can adopt to the strategies and policy changes under consideration.

This forum is intended for all those concerned about health system improvement. While the focus will be on central Pennsylvania, the presentations and ensuing discussion will offer important ideas for all involved in the health care industry. We believe this model creates a voice for primary care and provides a window to the physicians-in-practice for policy makers and those seeking to influence primary care service delivery. The long-term intentions are to:

- 1) Begin a process of constructive engagement among those interested in health care reform stakeholders in central PA;
- 2) Create a model that can lead to stimulate health system improvement in communities in the northeast region of the U.S.
- 3) Create business relationships that will lead to sustainable health system improvement initiatives.

5) “Group Visit Medical Appointments:

A Train-the-Trainer Workshop”

(Magnolia C) (8:00 am-noon)

The Future of Family Medicine Project has mandated office redesign to improve the quality of primary care. Patients with chronic disease comprise between 24-28% of care provided by family physicians. Group medical visits are ideal in addressing chronic health issues and health behaviors contributing to disease and disability, including smoking, diet, exercise and excessive alcohol use. They have shown to improve patient and physician satisfaction, decrease specialty and hospital medical costs, and improve physical outcomes and functioning. Group medical visits can improve participants’ disease-related knowledge and treatment compliance while training residents in motivational interviewing, group facilitation and brief, disease-oriented medical visits. The goal of this preconference is to present strategies, methods, and best practices to implement successful group medical visits and to encourage regional group medical visit projects.

Since 2001 the FMEC Group Medical Visit project has included annual preconference and workshops at the STFM: NE conference, the creation of a group medical visit list serve, and a multi-residency group medical project for patients with diabetes. All have led to increased activity and shared knowledge of group medical visits in the region. A multi-residency diabetes project is a direct consequence of the previous preconference presentations.

Goal: The goal of this preconference is to improve participants’ knowledge, attitudes and skills for implementing successful group medical visits into clinical and training programs and to encourage regional group medical visit projects.

- 1) Implement and train residents in the group medical visit model of care through increased knowledge, attitudes, skills and access to resources;
- 2) Describe the experience of being in a group medical visit for patients with diabetes;

- 4) Identify specific competencies that group medical visits address, organized by the six ACGME areas;

6) "Caring for Patients with Chronic Pain and Addictions"
(Magnolia A) (8:00 am-1:45 pm)

Caring for people suffering from chronic pain and addictions is challenging for all involved in the health care and mental health systems. This program will help participants develop strategies that can be used to offer comprehensive, compassionate and responsible services to this population. 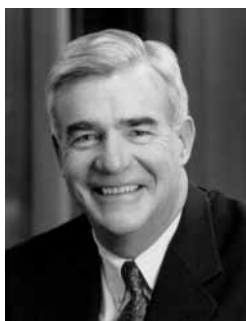

“Are You Kidding? Can We Fix This?”

– William J. Kane MD

Outcomes are disappointing, costs are out of control, 45 million (and increasing) Americans are uninsured and self interests are rampant. With exceptional resources, both clinical and financial, with global competitiveness at stake and with real solutions available, why can't the U.S. find a politically viable middle ground and do what is necessary for all of its citizens? Biographica Sketch – William J. Kane MD

Dr. William J. Kane is currently a Clinical Professor in the Department of Community and Family Medicine of Duke University Medical Center and a faculty member in the Master's Program in Health Sciences and Clinical Leadership. He is actively engaged in health care consulting, specializing in physician relations, group practice and cardiac services.

Dr. Kane is the former President and Chief Executive Officer of *InteCardia, Inc.*, a comprehensive cardiology imaging company purchased in late 2001 by *Syncor International*, Woodland Hills, CA. He is a frequent speaker to diverse professional organizations on the healthcare environment, cardiac services, and physician organization and communication strategies. He is the former Executive Vice President for Operations at *Sharp HealthCare* in San Diego. At *Sharp*, Dr. Kane had responsibility for hospitals, sub-acute facilities, and medical groups.

Prior to *Sharp HealthCare*, Dr. Kane was Senior Vice President at *Independence Blue Cross* in Philadelphia. His responsibilities included overseeing health care cost management and re-design of the PPO product, *Personal Choice*.

Dr. Kane has extensive experience in the managed health care field. As Executive Vice President of *CIGNA Healthplan, Inc.*, he was responsible for medical directions, utilization management and quality assurance for *CIGNA HMO's* throughout the United States. As *US Healthcare's* Senior Vice President of Medical Delivery, Dr. Kane directed the development and expansion of that organization's New Jersey and New York affiliates. He also directed the health care consulting group of an investment banking firm, and has been the Chief Executive Officer of an acute care hospital in New Jersey.

Dr. Kane received his B.S. in Biology (Cum Laude – Honors Program) from the University of Scranton in Pennsylvania, and his M.D. with Honors from Temple University School of Medicine in Philadelphia. He completed a residency in Family Medicine at the University of Rochester, Rochester, New York.

From 1974 through 1980, Dr. Kane was Chief of the Division of Family Medicine at Duke University. Prior to assuming his position at Duke University he was in private practice in rural New York State. He is a past president of the Society of Teachers of Family Medicine and is a former member of the Board of Directors of the Make-A-Wish Foundation of America. Dr. Kane currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Pisacano Leadership Foundation of the American Board of Family Practice.

Biographical Sketch – Wanda Filer MD

Dr. Wanda Filer is a family physician and founder of the *Strategic Health Institute*. She earned her medical doctorate from *Hahnemann University* in Philadelphia and completed her residency in family practice at *Underwood Memorial Hospital* in Woodbury, NJ, where she also served as chief resident.

Dr. Filer has a part-time clinical practice in York, PA and served as Pennsylvania's first Physician General. Dr. Filer appears nightly on the Lancaster, PA NBC affiliate *WGAL8* as a health correspondent, reaching over one million households nightly and delivering a broad array of health messages. Through her *Strategic Health Institute*, she combines the arenas of policy, public health education, and the media to build awareness of today's health issues and the need for change.

Dr. Filer is actively involved with many organizations on health policy improvement and advocacy development. Her main areas of focus include advancement of health services for underserved populations, family violence and community response to family violence, health advocacy development and public health improvement efforts. She lectures extensively on topics regarding public policy, public health, and patient access.

Dr. Filer is the president of the PA American Cancer Society as well as immediate past president of the Pennsylvania Academy of Family Physicians.

Thomas Weida MD a family physician in Hershey, PA, is speaker of the Congress of Delegates, the governing body of the American Academy of Family Physicians, and serves on the AAFP Board of Directors. Previously, Dr. Weida served as vice speaker for two years. The AAFP represents more than 93,700 physicians and medical students nationwide.

He is associate professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the Milton S. Hershey Medical Center, Penn State College of Medicine, Hershey, and serves on the Promotions Committee. He is medical director of the University Physician Group, which is affiliated with the Hershey Medical Center.

A member of the AAFP since 1977, Dr. Weida has served on numerous committees, including the Bylaws, Marketing and Public Relations, Finance, Members' AAFP Insurance and Financial Services, New Physicians, Scientific Programs, and Publications. He has been a delegate or an alternate delegate to the Congress of Delegates since 1988. In addition, he served on the editorial board of Family Practice Management, AAFP's practice management journal. He also reviews patient education materials for the Family Health Foundation of America. Dr. Weida testified on behalf of the AAFP to the Practicing Physician Advisory Council of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

A member of the Pennsylvania Academy of Family Physicians (PAFP) since 1977, Dr. Weida has served on numerous committees and task forces at the state level. He held the offices of vice-speaker and speaker of the PAFP House of Delegates; and vice president, president-elect, and president of PAFP. In addition, Dr. Weida has served on several committees of the Pennsylvania Medical Society and on the board of the Family Health Foundation of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Weida earned his undergraduate and medical degrees from the Lehigh-Hahnemann six-year B.A.-M.D. program at Lehigh University, Bethlehem, PA., and Hahnemann Medical College and Hospital, Philadelphia. He completed his family practice residency at Lancaster General Hospital. He is board certified by the American Board of Family Practice and is an AAFP Fellow, an earned degree awarded to family physicians for distinguished service and continuing medical education.

Dr. Weida is a member of the Society of Teachers of Family Medicine (STFM) and is a fellow of the College of Physicians of Philadelphia. Weida served on the editorial board of Pennsylvania Medicine, affiliated with the Pennsylvania Medical Society. In 1998, Harrisburg Magazine listed him among the top doctors in the Harrisburg area, and in 2002 he was listed in The Best Doctors in America by Best Doctors, Inc. He joined a solo practitioner in Lititz, Pa., and during a 13-year period increased the practice to include four physicians and four physician assistants. In 1993, his practice won the AAFP/STFM Patient Care Award for Patient Education by a Physician.

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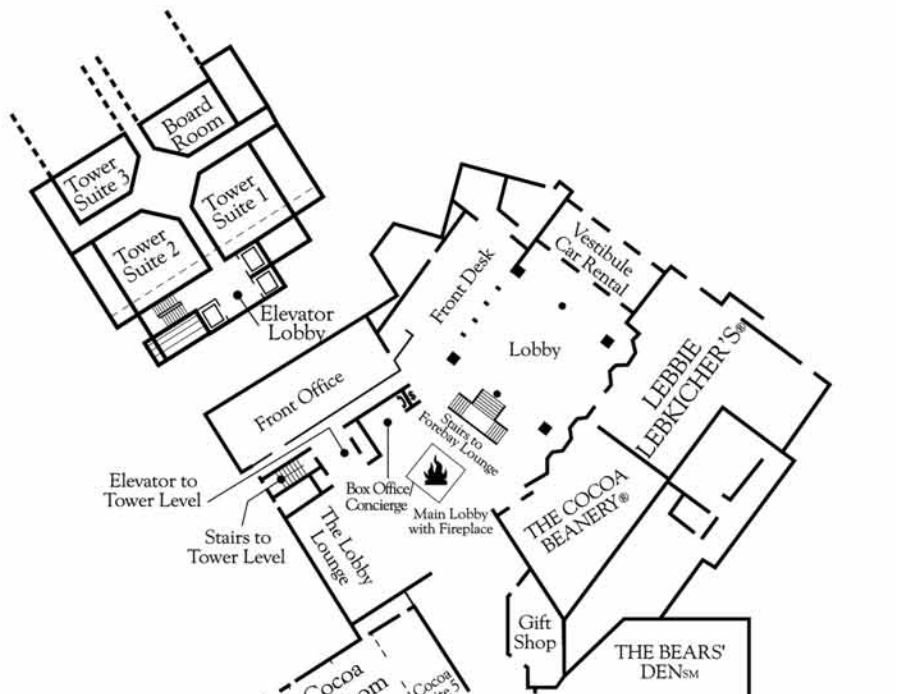

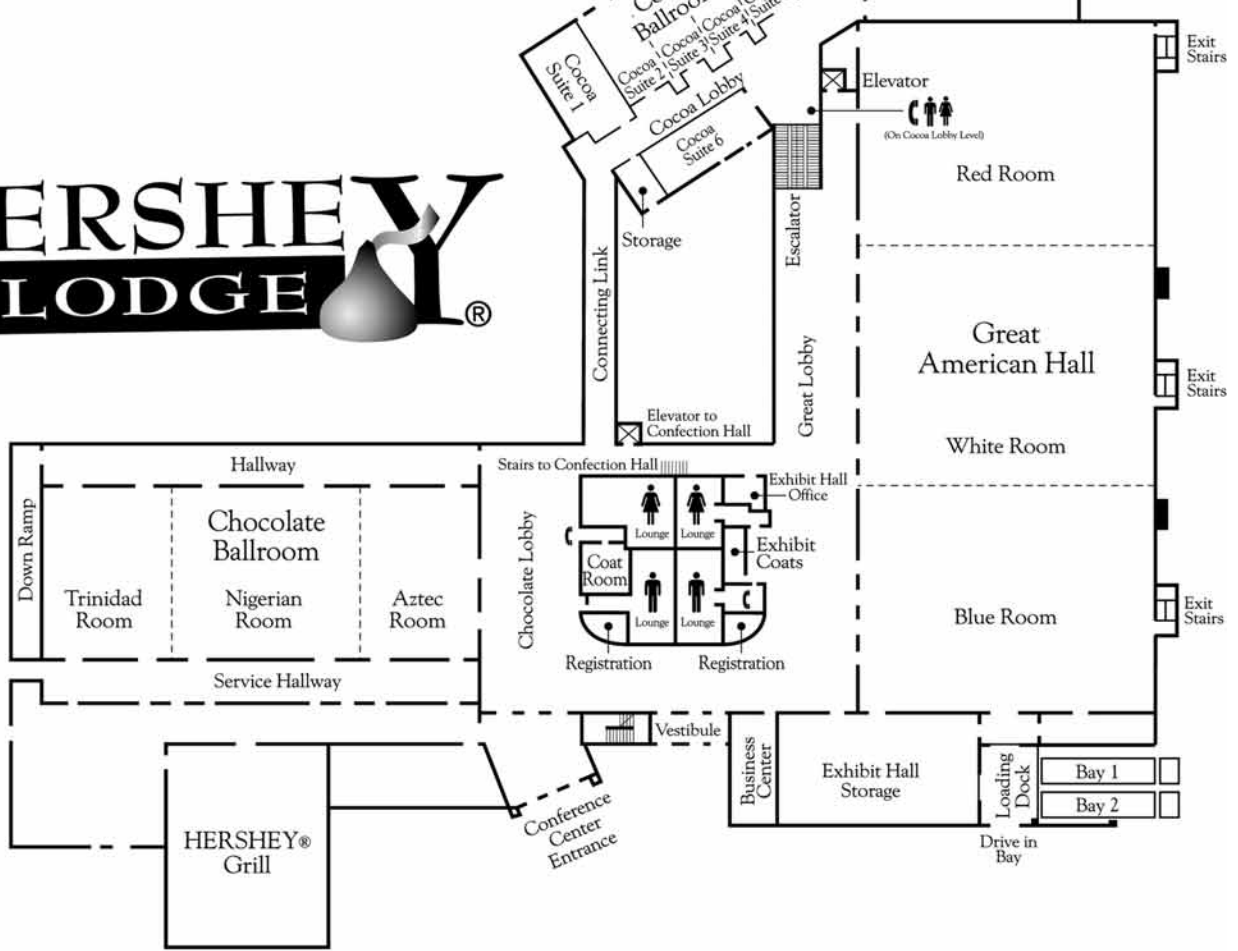
